FRANCE.-Strenuous exertions are being made to secure the election of General Cavaignac, but the cause of Louis Napoleon preponderates, The French Funds have improved.

In the assembly, Lamartine has proposed a reduction of 160,000, in the army appropriations. There was a report current in the Bourse that the 5 per cents had advanced I per cent.

No riot is expected to follow either the election of Cavaignac or Napoleon. Tho latter was enthusiastically greeted on his appearance in the Place Vendome with cnes of "Vive Napoleon!"


