We are told by them that New Mexico will be found, in a few days, knocking at the doors of Congress for edmission as a free and independent State end will have as good a right to admission as California. The Philadelphia organ of the administration says, exaltingly:

. The new event has, in fact, given an unexpected char arier to the bill, and must must diminish its cliances among nurthern men; while it adds incalculably to the arrength and the prespects of the President's plan."

The effort now being made to thrust New Mexico into the Union, has most undoubtedly been instigated by the Cabinet. It is part of that desperate game for defouting the Compromise, which the Galphins are bent on accom plishing. It remains to be seen, whether Congress wi tolerate this interference of the Executive with the measgres which Congress have under deliberation. It wil be chespening much, indeed, the privilege of admission into this Union, when Congress shall admit a State without any previous census of its population, and when the most sythemic intelligence will not justify us in estimating its white American inhabitants over 900. Congress has already refused to admit a delegate from New Mexico to a seat-doubiless for antisfactory reasons. It is hardly probable that the privilege, so soon after that refusal, will be accorded her of sending three members of Congress. The only disposition which will be made of New Mexico, will be that provided by the Compromise bill. If that shall full, New Mexico will probably be suffored to remain, for the present, under her present military government.


