By a late arrival from the Cape of Good Hopel it is stated that the Kaffigs had committed several nets of insubordination, and that some of the tribes had attacked a Methodist Episcopal station, and murdered a member of of the residents. Sir Harry Smith, the Governor, had determined to prosecute a vigorous war against them.

From the Observer, of October 22nd, we learn what is regarded as the moving cause of the bressent Kaffir troubles. It is stated that a young Kuffir prophet by the name of Umingeni, is attracting great attention in British Kaffiraris. He has given out that he is a great prophet; and is pursuing a similar course to that of his uncle, Unxele, who insugated the Kaffir war of 1819. He tells the chiefs that he can, by his power, drive the English into the sea, and that he can render their guns useless against his brethren.
