Every year'in adding strength to the society; and it is anticipated that the time is not far distant when nearly all of the citizens of our whole county will see the importance of aiding in this work, by becoming members of the society and contributing their best productions to make the annual exhibition more attractive, so well as more highly instructive. The officers receive no compensation whatever for their services, and the entire funda received are appropriated for Premiums, &c. Therefore by increased strength every year, the Premiums can accordingly be increased to promote the interest of the Agriculturalist, the Horticulturalist, the Manufacturer, and the Mechanic. The accounts of the Treasuter are carefully audited every year, and an exhibit will hereafter be published showing the amount of receipts and expenditures for every year since the organization of the society.
