STOCETON, Jan. 28th, 1852. Mr. EDITOR .- I have been in California about one month and have not found, the first lump of gold yet, but then I am on the sick list, and have only traveled from San Francisco to this point. The passage was made on a steamer in the night and for that reason I can tell you nothing about the country between the two places. This 13 quite a handsome little city, situate in the plains, and built upon a slough which puts into the San Joaquin about four miles below. The slough branches out into three prongs terminating in the town. It is a port of entry,-the supplying depot for the southern mines,and the steamers and shipping are scattered all around among the benses. The principle port of the place was bornt down last summer, and this calamity has much crippled its business; it contains, however, at this time some seven theusand inhabitants, is built principally of wood, and covers quite an area of ground. The climate at this time is quite fine; the evenings cool and bracing; the days warm and sunny, the thermometer renging at noon at about 60. The birds sing merily in the branches of the oaks which are scattered over the plain, and the people when at labor go about in shirt sleeves .-There has been two slight frosts within the last swenty days, but the flowers are buding forth on the prairie, and the gardens make one's mouth water to look at. Of the latter I saw one divided into four different departments. each division bearing vegitables in a different degree of advancement, from the tender sprout to the matured plant, and of all varieties. There is no country in the world that can surpass, and few equal California, in the production of vegetables. Their markets teem with monater pumpking, beets, carrots, potatoes, onions and cabbage. What is most astonishing is the facility and case with which these as well as the small grains are produced. No artificial means have as yet been resorted to, there being quite a sufficiency of vacuat lands on the immediate banks of the rivers and streams for those who have heretofore given their attention to this branch of industry. In these bottoms you have only to sew; and in a short time you may commonce gathering in vegetables the year round, and in the small grains for two or three successive years. I am credibly informed that in one instance a single stalk produced consecutively eight full grown, large sized, cabbages, and in another that one sowing of wheat produced to the acre, the first cross ninety bushels, the second sixty, and the third twenty bushels. I am aware that this is a very extravagent more, but remember that barley, outs and grass, grow wild upon the plains and hitle, and that this is California. Many, people are now turning their attention to farming, for the reason that, as in all other conutries, so in this, it is the most certain investment of money and labor But I presume you would like me to be a little more statistical in my information, and as I have been poking my nose into everybody's busines lately. I can tell you something perhaps of interest. I will however preface what I am about to say with the remark that prices in most cases are gradually declining. Common laborera and servants receive from \$50 to \$75 par month; Carpenters from \$5 to \$7 per day; Blacksmiths \$8: Printers 22 ner thousand: wood per cord \$12; sweet potatoes, Turnips and Tematoes 124 cents per pound: Onious 25 cents per pound; Egge \$3 per dozen; Hens from \$3 to \$5 Horse and saddle per day \$10. Dry goods and glothing may be purchased at about 30 per cent on the prices in the Eastern States. Fast Horses, game Cocks, blooded dogs, pet bears and Women, are beyond valuationfly any monied standard.

Our State government is in rather a pickle. The people moved it from San Jose, to Valliejo; the Governor moved it back again; the Legislature met and for a few days made Valliejo again the Capital. Very soon, however, all parties became discontented, and then there was great biding for the "assembled wisdom." San Francisco offered them rooms to hold their deliberations in, Stockton proposed to liquor them in addition, bet Sacramento cut them all out by adding season tickets forthe Theatre-So they moved to Sacramento, where, by all accounts, they have a july time of it. The choice spirits of the two houses have formed themselves into what they call the "Third House," and elected a Governor, Speaker, etc. etc. and to this they retire after the first and second culing the conduct of the two former grave bedies .-Nevertheless, the State has good statute book, the laws are equitable and just, and quite suited to the necessities of the times; the i-beral doctrines of a Democratic people are made practical in every section and page, whilst their application is made as cheap, quick, and as full as pessible. In short, I think an improvement upon the older states. There, that's as long a letter as you can expect from an invalid, much longer than many of your roaders will probably wade through. 
