From Washington. Correspondence of the Buffalo Courier. WASHINGTON, Dec. 18, 1852. Ma. Epiron .- The only subject matter of unional importance considered in Congress during the past week has been the tariff, the proper plan of so altering the existing revenue laws, as that in future no more revenue may be collected through them than will prove sufficien for the economical wants of the Government. The apparent surplus randers some change necessary. I say apparent surplus, because I feel convinced that we have at this time not a dollar in the Treasury which cannot be promptly expended, with great advantage, to the public service. Mr. Brooks, of New York, on the second day of the session, took occasion, you will recollect, to move for the appointment of a select committee to revise the tariff, who should so discharge that duty as to extend the free list for the benefit of the American manufacturer, or, in other words, to increase the protection afforded at this time under the tariff of 1846. So far, but one other member has advocated the principle of change which Mr. Brooks thus foreshadewed. I refer to Mr. Mr. Duneau, of Massachusetts, a whig representative of a purely manufacturing constituency. Messrs, Cleveland, of Connecticut, and Jones, of Pennsylvania, each have pleaded earnestly for the perpetuation of the protection now accorded under the existing law. All the other speeches upon the subject have been in favor of decreasing the duties generally, or, an few words, for anapproximation towards free trade. A dozen questions have been voted on, in committee of the whole on the state of the Union, with results going to convince us that beyond peradventure, when the approaching change shall be made, the interests, now specially protected, will find themselves shorn of at least a portion of the laws' favor

Mr. Woodward, of South Carolina, made, by long odds, the ablest speech yet delivered on the subject. 
