The Battleship Maine Blown up in Havana Harbor. tain tone. The following is his admir-able letter: WASHINGTON, Feb. 5, 1898. At 9:45 P. M., Tuesday night a terrific explosion took place at the bow

of the battleship Maine in Havana harbor. Two hundred and sixty are reported to have lost their lives, of which two are officers and the balance seamen.

Captain Sigsbee, commander of the Maine, reports that twenty-four officers and sixty-eight men, many of whom nd sixty-eight men, many of whom re badly injured, have been saved. While taking the men from the preckage a second explosion took dace at two o'clock Wednesday morn-ng. The battleship now lies partially are badly injured, have been saved. wreckage a second explosion took place at two o'clock Wednesday morning.

The battleship now lies partially submerged, and Captain Sigsbee believes the major portion of it can be saved.

The cause of the explosion is a mystery and the Administration has decided to regard the disaster to the Maine as an accident, until a full report is made by Captain Sigsbee. Killed at a Log Slide.
