The heavy wind Tuesday evening scalped a few chimneys around town, and gave a number of our business men employment cleaning their windows, the wind having completely be-smeared them with mud. For about forty-five minutes the gale was terrific, and it is a great wonder that much damage was not done.

The extension of the New York and Pennsylvania railroad from Millport to Shingle House will in all probability be completed this season. 


