By Webster's test, which, then, is the "true American policy," Protection or Free Trade? In 1892 we had Protection, and American capital and American labor both were fully and renumeratively employed. From 1893 to 1897 we had a Free-Trade President and a Free-Trade policy culminating in a Free-Trade law, and American workmen sat in idelness, while American capitalists husbanded their resourses and guarded their idle money as best they could. Since 1897 we have had Protection again, and there is demand and employment for every dollar of American capital and for every American working man. Webster's prediction has proved true. Under Free-Trade, agriculture, commerce and manufacturers languish together; under Protection they all prosper together.—American Economist.

Pennsy's New Buffalo Line.

It was announced officially yesterday that the Western New York and Pennsylvania Railroad Company will become part of the Allegheny Valley R'y system as soon as all the details pertaining to the securing of the control of the company by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company have been completed. The Western New York & Pennsylvania has a line from Oil City to Rochester, also a line from Emporium to Buffalo and from Oil City to Buffalo. The mileage is about 642 miles, of which 45 miles are leased and 597 miles owned. The Allegheny Valley Railway is controlled by the Pennsylvania, although it is operated as a distinct corporation. It is 259 miles long and its tracks from Pittsburg to Oil City are used by the

Western New York & Pennsylvania. While no information in regard to the number of shares of stock and income bonds deposited by the security holders of the Western New York & Pennsylvania has been given out, it is stated that more than the majority has been deposited. Each holder that has complied with the letter sent by President DeCorsey has received a temporary receipt, and it is stated that upon the surrender of this receipt on or after June 15 the Pennsylvania Railroad Company will pay cash for it at the rate of \$9 a share for each stock and \$300

Some of the directors and officials of the Pennsylvania are now making a tour of inspection of the Western New York & Pennsylvania and Allegheny Valley Railroads and it is understood that a number of changes are to be made in regards to reducing the grades and the elimination of sharp curves.

The physical condition of the new acquisition is fairly good and on the Buffalo division the work of equipping it with eighty-pound steel rails is now going on, and on the other divisions seventy-pound rails are now being put down. The Pennsylvania Railroad Company has for several days past been running a through train from Philadelphia to Buffalo by the way of the main line, Northern Central and Philadelphia and Erie Roads to Emporium, the rest of the route being over the Western New York & Pennsylvania Railroad. It is also stated that an improved service is to be put into effect between Pittsburg and Buffalo.-Philadelphia Press.
