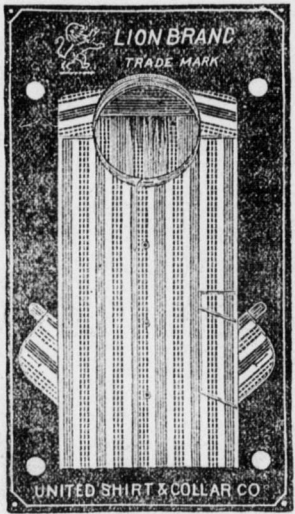

The Republicans of Cameron county met in convention at the Court House, last Tuesday, Aug. 13th. The convention was called to order by B. W. Green, Esq., chairman of county committee.
