Moved by Mr. Hacket, seconded by Mr. Murphy that proper officers be authorized to make a deed to David Murry for lot No 42 in Newton Cemetery, if not already deeded, and received in payment his receipt for services to date. Carried.

Moved by Howard, seconded by Murphy, that President of Council be given authority to discharge any policeman which he considers necessary during convention. Carried.  
Moved by Hacket seconded by Catlin that we drop street Commissioner and his duties be given to street committee.  
Moved by Mr. Howard seconded by Mr. Murphy that the forgoing motion be laid on table. Carried.  
Moved by Mr. Howard seconded by Shafer that Street Commissioner and policeman be instructed to enforce ordinance regarding rubbish thrown in the street. Carried.

**TOUR TO THE PACIFIC COAST.**
