A LOCAL CONTEST

Pittsburg Election Has No Bear ing Upon State Politics.

THE STALWARTS ARE PLEASED

Philadelphia's Splendid Majerity Will Surely Be Increased In the Fall Campaign, Say Her Republican

(Special Correspondence.) Harrisburg, Feb. 25.-Now that they have had time to make an analysis of the returns of the recent election in this state, Republicans of Pennsylvania have every reason to be pleased with the outcome of the balloting. While there were no state issues involved in any contest in the several counties, the stalwart Republican element made material gains in many quarters. They have unquestionably strengthened their position in the state, and a most significant fact shown in the election returns is the almost complete annihilation of the so-called Union party. This political mush-room, which sprung up in the fight Wanamakerites to elect the Philadelphia merchant to the United States senate, has virtually ceased to exist. It continues practically in name only, with a few of its officers still willing to allow their names to be associated with it.

In many clean-cut contests in counties in which there were heretofore fusion movements the regular Republicans carried everything before them at last week's election.

The insurgent organization formed in the deadlock over the United States senatorship by members of the legis-lature identified with the bolting element no longer exists. The sentiment upon which this movement was based continues to be expressed through Democratic and assistant Democratic newspapers which long ago lost what little influence they had with voters.

PURELY LOCAL FIGHT. These newspapers are now seeking to convey the impression that the result of the recent election in Pittsburg means the annihilation of the present leadership of the Republican organiza-tion of the state, and that the election of a Democrat to the office of controller of Pittsburg is going to have a far-reaching influence upon the action of the coming Republican state convention.

The facts of the case are that this was a local contest pure and simple. There was a bitter factional struggle between rival elements within the Republican organization of Pittsburg. Senator Flinn had been unable to pre-serve the harmony which had existed among Pittsburg Republicans for many years under the leadership of the late C. L. Magee. He found himself at odds with the powerful Bigelow-Oliver combination of capitalists, and with every heretofore stalwart Republican newspaper arrayed against his ticket in the late campaign. A quarrel over the street railway franchises and differences growing out of the new charter legislation resulted in a very exciting campaign. Flinn and his friends, who control the regular Republican organization, had to fight a combination of Democrats and dissatisfied Republicans, who united upon a fusion candidate for controller, a Democrat named Larkin.

In view of the associations which many of them had before this contest was started, Republicans throughout the state concluded not to meddle in this family row, and the contest was waged absolutely upon local issues.

It has no bearing upon state politics, and the result of the election will not in any way influence the action of the coming state convention. The Republican candidate in Pittsburg was defeated only by 8,000 votes. It was in no sense a stalwart Republican defeat. Many are of the opinion that Apropos of the question of war this result may have the effect of getting the factions in Pittsburg together fected in the slightest degree. The Democrats are, of course, elated, but Democrats into office in a Republican

nomination of Attorney General John P. Elkin for governor. When it is recalled that Mr. Elkin was one of the most aggressive stalwart leaders fighting Flinn when the Pittsburger was at the head of the insurgent organization it will be seen that any reverse that Flinn might suffer could not affect Mr. Elkin's chances of nomination or election.

By the official returns just computed today the Republican candidate for city solicitor in Philadelphia, John L. Kinsey, has a plurality of 119,308 over the candidate of the Democracy and the Municipal League, who received but 35,384 votes, representing the combined strength of these organizations as against 154,692 polled by the Repub-


