Punishing Boodlers and Bribers.

City Attorney Joseph W. Folk is looking after the political house-cleaning in St. Louis in a masterly way. He has already sent three prominent citizens to the penitentiary for political corruption and he is in a fair way to secure conviction in a dozen other cases. St. Louis has been under the political control of a gang of boodlers and bribers for ten years or more and until young Mr. Folk appeared on the scene no one seemed to dare take the matter in hand. Last week Col. Edward Butler, a millionaire and politician who has controlled elections in that city for years, was convicted of bribery in connection with a city garbage contract and he was sentenced last Friday to three years in prison. Butler's son is a member of Congress from St. Louis.

There are numerous other cities where municipal corruption has been known for years and they need men of just the character of Mr. Folk to take matters in hand. A remarkable feature of matters in St. Louis is that Mr. Folk was nominated and elected through the influence of the very gang of "leaders" he is now sending to prison so rapidly, and he announced that if he was elected to the office he should do his duty; but the politicians thought his promise was like that of the demagogue and he was young and not considered dangerous.

Every good citizen should feel satisfaction over the punishment of those who corrupt municipal government, of ballot box stuffers, of political boodlers and bribers, of bribe-takers and scallwags in high places as well as those of low degree. Every instance of reform like that now going on in St. Louis is a hopeful sign of the times. Let men like Mr. Folk come to the front and let the good work go on.—Tioga Agitator.
