The Montreal Witness says: "From recently published United States Government returns for the year 1902, an idea may be obtained of the drift of European emigration. The most striking feature in these returns is the large decrease in the number of emigrants from the British Isles to the United States, compared with former years. Twenty years ago the great majority of Imigrants arriving in the United States were from Germany the United Kingdom and Scandinavia. Last year the largely preponderating nationalities were Austro-Hungarian, Russian and Italian. Even Irish emigrants, who have always preferred the United States, went there in less numbers than in any previous year. The greatest falling off of all was in the number of German immigrants. The figures are interesting in view of the question whether the human tide now setting toward the United States is of the right character out of which to make American citizens.
