CALL FOR STATE CONVENTION.

TO THE REPUBLICAN ELECTORS OF PENNSYLVANIA:

I am directed by the Republican State Committee to announce that the Republicans of Pennsylvania, by their duly chosen Representatives, will meet in convention at the Opera House, in the city of Harrisburg, on Wednesday, May 27th, 1903, at 10:30 o'clock, a.m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following offices, to-wit:

One person for the office of State Treasurer. One person for the office of Auditor General. Two persons for the office of Judge of the Superior Court.

In accordance with the rules governing the organization, the representation in the State Convention will be based on the vote polled at the last Presidential election. Under the rules each legislative district is entitled to one delegate for every two thousand votes cast for the Presidential Electors in 1900, and additional delegate for every fraction of one thousand votes polled in excess of one thousand.

Regular meeting, Borough Council, Emporium, May 4th, 1903.

Present: Messrs. Freindle, Hacket, Balcom, Green, Marshall, Nelson, Catlin. Absent: Messrs. Housler, Cummings.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Moved by Hacket, seconded by Freindle, that the resolution of April 6th, last, regarding the hauling of fire trucks be passed notwithstanding the veto of the Burgess. The ayes and nays were called as follows:

Aye: Messrs. Freindle, Hacket, Green, Marshall, Catlin, 5.

Nay: Messrs. Balcom, Nelson, 2.

Moved by Catlin, seconded by Freindle, that an Electric Arc Light be placed at the corner of Sixth street and Woodland Avenue. Carried.

On motion by Marshall, seconded by Freindle, duly carried, the following bills were ordered paid:

St. Marys Gas Co., for April 1903... \$19.80. Murry & Coppersmith Co., Invoice (2) 8.71. John Schwellhart... Drying hose... 1.00.

The reports of the Treasurer, Chief of Police and Burgess were filed.

Moved by Hacket, seconded by Green, that an ordinance entitled "An ordinance requiring an annual license tax on Telephone and other poles, and on wire on the streets of the Borough of Emporium and providing for penalty for violation of this ordinance and collection of the same", be passed, enacted and ordained. The ayes and nays were called and the councilmen voted as follows:

Aye: Messrs. Freindle, Hacket, Balcom, Green, Marshall, Nelson, Catlin, 7. Nay: 0. The motion was declared carried.

Moved by Freindle, seconded by Marshall, that a borough tax of ten (10) mills; a borough water tax of five (5) mills; and a tax or penalty of \$1 on dogs and \$2 on bitches be levied for the year 1903. Unanimously carried.

Moved by Hacket, seconded by Nelson, that the sewer of C. H. Jessop, as now connected be declared a nuisance and that the chief of police be instructed to notify him to abate the same within two weeks after service of notice. Carried.

On motion the council then adjourned.
