**Profit in Strawberries.**  
People who are tinkering around with a small patch of strawberries should read the following from the Tucker County (W. Va.) Herald:  
Think what this means: Thirty thousand quarts of strawberries were picked Friday from the 100-acre patch of State Senator E. Finley Cromwell, in the suburbs of Norfolk. These were picked by 300 negroes, who received for the day's work \$600, at the rate of 2 cents a quart. The picking, packing and crates cost \$900, and the berries were sold to a local firm for 9 cents a quart. The firm resold them at a profit of \$150, and the berries were then shipped North. Mr. Cromwell received for the day's pick \$2,700.
