Early Combines and Corners

"Engrossing" was an offense punish able in England by fine and imprison ment, and the laws against it struck at those—called "engrossers"—who plan-ned to gain control over necessities, such as grain or food stuffs in considerable quantities, either by purchase or otherwise, with the intention of raising

The statute book holds quite a series of enactments designed to prevent any thing in the nature of what we know as a "corner" or "combine." "Regrat-lng" was a criminal offense, and so was "forestalling." The former consisted of buying and selling the same day in the same market or near it, and the latter implied the purchase of merchandise on the way to market or before the hour at which the market commenced, with the intention of selling at a profit, while it was also "forestalling" to circulate rumors calculated to raise the prices of commodities.

Though these laws have fallen into desuetude, they were in force in our grandfathers' time. At Preston, for instance, there were prosecutions almost up to the accession of Queen Victoria.
