#### SEVERE STORMS.

The Suburbs of Chicago Suffer From Their Work.

Eighteen Houses Wrecked at Indiana Harbor, Ind. - Reports of Destruction in Others Towns -Many People Were Injured.

Chicago, March 25 .- One of the most severe storms this city has known in many years passed over Chicago last night. Great damage was done in the suburbs to the south of the city and considerable loss was sustained north of the city proper. The storm did not strike the business portion of the city in its great-

est force.
The town of Indiana Harbor, miles southeast of Chicago, on the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern railroad, was the heaviest sufferer. One man, L. Barker, the proprietor of a dry goods store, was killed and 15 persons who were in his store when the storm struck were injured, some of them conjected. of them seriously.

of them seriously.

Eighteen residences were blown down and several persons were hurt in the ruins of their homes. It is almost impossible to obtain full details because of the condition of the telegraph and telephone wires, nearly all of them being down for miles between Chicago and Indiana Harbor. The wires of the electric lines were knocked down and the power was knocked down and the power was shut off, making it impossible for anybody to reach the place save on the regular trains of the railroads

The number of people injured at Indiana Harbor will probably approximate 25. All three of the hotels in the place were badly damaged, Green's hotel in particular being badly wrecked. One two-story building was turned entirely over.

The storm in the vicinity of Indiana Harbor was the most severe ever

Harbor was the most severe ever known there. Three people are known to be dead, several are fatally hurt and at midnight there were several others reported missing and they may be buried in the ruins of their homes.

A two-story brick building was

A two-story brick building was blown down and a number of people who had sought shelter there were buried in the ruins.

The storm created havoe in the town of Hammond, Ind. A number of residences were badly damaged, and two people were injured, but not fatally. One end of the large plant of the Republic Iron and Steel Co, was blown down, causing a loss of at least \$25,000. A number of business houses were unroofed and the city was in total darkness, so many of the electric light wires were blown down.

The authorities compelled the company to shut off all power, lest lives

The authorities compened the company to shut off all power, lest lives might be lost through contact with live wires. In the freight yards of the roads running through Hammond great damage was done, Many cars were unroofed or blown over and the yards in many places are piled wifth wreckage.

In Grand Crossing, eight miles south of the center of the city, a number of buildings were wrecked, freight cars blown about the yards and the tracks of the railroads covered with debris to such an extent that the majority of incoming trains were compelled to call upon their passengers to assist in removing the wreckage from the tracks so that the trains ge from the tracks so that the trains

The telegraph and telephone companies suffered greatly south of the city. Up to midnight not a wire was working east of Indiana Harbor on any of the three railroads running through the place. Telephone communication was possible only as far as Whiting, Ind., three miles west of Indiana Harbor. The street car lines running from Chicago in the direction of Whiting and Indiana Harbor were all out of business, their wires having been blown down in a number having been blown down in a number

Grand Rapids, Mich., March 24.—A small but destructive tornado struck the south end of the city last night, doing damage that reaches into the thousands. Two persons were in-jured, barns were laid flat, chimneys and other portions of houses were blown away, stock was killed, houses were thrown from their foundations and trees uprooted. Besides there was considerable damage by lightning.

#### ON TRIAL FOR THEFT.

Seven Men of the Marine Corps are Accused of Stealing Government Sup-

Washington, March 25.—Two non-commissioned officers and five privates of the United States marine corps are being tried by general court-martial at the Washington barracks here on the charge of robbing Capt. Robert S. Wynne, acting quartermaster, of \$1,000 worth of government supplies at the barracks here last August.

Private Charles F. McMullin was put on trial Thursday. Private Waldo E. Smith already has pleaded guilty and the others accused, who will be tried at once, are Sergeant Andrew Mellott, Acting Quartermaster Sergeant William Chan and Privates Harry Thompson, Edward B. Wentworth and Henry Montague. The property was stolen in Washington and nearly all of it disposed of here, but the sterling was revealed in Panbut the stealing was revealed in Pan-ama, where McMullin confessed to Capt. Wynne.

Are Allowed to Carry Firearms.

Cleveland, March 25 .- Police Judge Fiedler held Thursday that non-union men employed at the Westinghouse plant were justified in carrying revolvers. A man whose arrest on a revolvers. A man whose arrest on a charge of carrying concealed weapons had been made as a test case was discharged. More than 100 non-union men now working at the plant are said to be armed with revolvers. The situation has become critical. ### PEOPLE HOMELESS. DeWitt

Heavy Rains Cause Destruction in Lower Michigan.

Losses to Property, Railroads Block aded and Industries Closed Are Reported from a Number of Cities in Southern Part of State.

Detroit, March 26 .- Conservative estimates of the damage caused by the flooded rivers and creeks of lower Michigan during the past 24 hours place the property loss at more than \$1,000,000. At Lansing alone the figures are placed at \$200,000. Two lives have been lost, those of an unknown Armenian who was standing on a bridge at Lansing when it collapsed and was washed away, and a boy who was drowned in a flooded street at Owosso. Reports from many places last night told of a steady downpour

of rain with no sign of a let up.
All trains were abandoned Friday
on the Michigan Central railroad between Jackson and Saginaw. On the Michigan Central's main line between Jackson and Niles conditions were such at Battle Creek and Wheatfield that this part of the line was aban-doned and through trains are being run from Jackson to Niles over the air line division, cutting off Marshall, Battle Creek and Kalamazoo entirely for the present as far as this road is concerned. Trains between Jackson and Grand Rapids on the Michigan Central have also been abandoned Officials of the road state that with one or two exceptions there have been no washouts and that traffic will be resumed as soon as the water

The Pere Marquette is blocked at The Pere Marquette is blocked at Flint and was blocked for a time near Lansing. Passengers were trans-ferred at the latter point, however, and in this way tra@ic over the De-troit-Grand Rapids division was maintained, though delayed several hours. Detroit, Toledo & Muskegon rail-From Kalamazoo comes the report

that every bridge for 40 miles along the Kalamazoo river has been swept away. In Kalamazoo 3,000 people have been thrown out of work. Houses in that city have been swept from their foundations and portions of the track of the Lake Shore Michigan Traction Co, and Chicago, Kalamazoo & Saginaw railroads have been washed away.

At Lansing many manufacturing plants that escaped the flood were compelled to shut down by the break-ing of the feed wire connecting them with the Piatt power plant. About 25 residences at Lansing have been flooded and the Kalamazoo and Logan street bridges have gone out. fires resulted from the flood at Lan-

At Owosso the water is three feet deep around houses where it was never known to reach before. Much damage was done at Jackson.

At Saginaw the river is being filled with floating ice. A new \$2,000 footbridge went out and other bridges vere saved by the use of dynamite. Grand Rapids, Mich., March 26, The flood situation in western Michigan is the worst in 25 years. Grand river is rising by leaps and the valley which it drains resembles in many localities large lakes, while at other points the swollen stream is quite two miles wide. All the large nearby towns along it are practically under

Over 50 manufacturing firms along the canals and river and in close proximity are flooded and forced to shut down and 6,000 men are out of employment. A large portion of the city is flooded and scores of families had to abandon their dwellings.

#### BUSINESS BAROMETER. Spring Trade Is Expanding, Though

Backward to Some Extent. New York, March 26,—R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade says:

Little net change in trade conditions is noted for the past week. Storms and floods did much damage to property and threatened agricultural prospects at the start, but subsequently the weather improved and the outlook brightened. 
