That Per Capita Tax.

EDITOR PRESS:—The question of school tax is so often raised that we request you to publish the following ruling of Attorney General:

OFFICE OF ATTORNEY GENERAL, Harrisburg, Pa., July 15th, 1904.

HON. JOHN Q. STEWART, Deputy Sup't. of Public Instruction.

MY DEAR SIR:—

Your letter of July 9th, raises a question as to the proper construction of the Act of July 22nd, 1897 (P. L. 305). This Act is entitled "An Act to authorize and empower the school directors and controllers of the several school districts within this Commonwealth to levy and collect a per capita tax annually for school purposes," and in the first section provides that it shall be lawful for the school directors or school controllers of any city, borough or township within this Commonwealth to levy and collect annually a per capita tax of one dollar for school purposes from each and every male inhabitant of the age of twenty-one years and upwards within their respective districts. The third section of the act provides that this per capita tax shall be in lieu of the occupation tax for school purposes.

Under the various Acts of Assembly prior to 1897 there were two classes of taxes for school purposes as follows: 1. That based on real estate and personal property, and 2. That based on trades, occupations, professions, etc., providing for a minimum occupation tax of one dollar in such cases where the rate on the valuation of occupation would not yield one dollar.

The Act of July 22, 1897, expressly provides that it shall in no wise limit or abridge the power of school directors or controllers to levy a tax on real and personal property for school and building purposes. It, therefore, does not in any manner seek to change or modify the method or rate of taxing real estate and personal property subject to such tax.

The precise question, then, presented by your communication is, what is the effect of the Act of July 22, 1897, upon prior legislation so far as it relates to the levying and collecting of occupation tax?

When we remember that this Act is one affecting public interests and relating to public officers, and that it is, therefore, mandatory upon such public officers, we can have no doubt as to the legal effect thereof. The old laws provided one method of ascertaining the occupation tax, while the new Act provides a different one. Both can stand, and for this reason the later Act must be held to operate as a repeal of the former provision.

With these observations, you are advised that, under the laws, as modified by the Act of July 22, 1897, school boards have authority:

- 1. To assess and levy taxes for school purposes upon real estate and personal property in the manner heretofore provided; and
2. To assess an occupation or per capita tax of one dollar upon each and every male inhabitant of the age of twenty-one years and upwards. This per capita tax is in lieu of the occupation tax levied under the old law, and the amount thereof cannot be exceeded in any case, no matter at what age the occupation, trade or profession may have been valued by the assessor for State and county purposes.

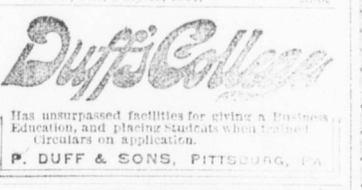
