Chicago Employers Find a New Ally in the Crusade Against Strikes.

Chicago, Oct. 8 .- The Chicago Em ployers' association on Friday, through Attorney Dudley Taylor, brought into operation a law that has lain dormant operation a law that has lain dormalit for years, by which it is believed picketing, violence and the crippling of industries by strikes can be pre-vented. It is "an act to prohibit any person from obstructing the regular operation and conduct of the business of any railcoad company or other corof any railroad company or other cor poration, firm or individual." 


