Notwithstanding this partial protection, when Mrs. Trol-lope wrote the "Factory Boy" in 1840 it was illustrated by pictures of rag-ged and emaciated children which would now be regarded only as gross exaggerations of the truth, but which then produced no adverse comment and were perhaps as influential in reforming the abuses they displayed as was "Uncle Tom's Cabin" in calling attention to the evils of slavery .- New York World.


