Beckwith was president of the now defunct Citizens' national bank, of Oberlin. Although the capital stock of the bank was but \$50,000 Beckwith loaned Mrs. Chadwick \$240,000.

MRS. CHADWICK BEHIND THE BARS.

AFTER A FRUITLESS SEARCH FOR BAIL SHE IS FORCED TO OCCUPY A CELL IN THE TOMBS.

It is said that Mrs. Chadwick will be prosecuted in Ohio on charges of Forgery—Beckwith is Reported to Have Made a Startling Confession.

New York, Dec. 9.—Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick last night occupied one of the scantily furnished cells in the Tombs. She was held in default of \$15,000 bail for a hearing on December 17, after being arraigned before Commissioner Shields.

The party passed through a double row of curious people to a carriage which was in waiting. They were driven directly to the Tombs. Arriving there Mrs. Chadwick was half carried up the steps and into the building. Warden Flynn met the party, and after the usual preliminaries had been attended to the woman asked permission to have her nurse remain with her.

While lying on a couch in the United States marshal's office awaiting a bondsman, Mrs. Chadwick, for the first time since her name has been before the public, consented to talk for publication, and gave the representatives of the Associated Press a statement in which she denied relationship to Mrs. York, of San Francisco, who gave out an interview yesterday telling of the earlier life of Mrs. Chadwick.

Mrs. Chadwick also told of the Wade Park and Oberlin bank matters. Referring to the failure of the latter institution she said: "I would not like to live a minute if I did not think I could pay these poor people back."

In the communications in New York between Mr. Carnegie and representatives of the Oberlin bank, Mr. Carnegie denied absolutely that he had signed the notes which have figured in the case as the Carnegie notes, and denied that he knows or ever saw Mrs. Chadwick.

Cleveland, Dec. 9.—Frank M. Chandler, United States marshal, and Benjamin Parmely, assistant in the office of the United States district attorney, went to Oberlin Wednesday night and succeeded in getting a complete confession from C. T. Beckwith, president of the wrecked Citizens' national bank.

The forced Carnegie notes were uttered in Cuyahoga county, according to testimony given before the grand jury of Lorain county Thursday.

Prosecutor Lee Stroup telephoned to Prosecutor Keeler yesterday that the testimony of Cashier Spear and other witnesses showed that the notes had not been negotiated in Oberlin. This will make Cleveland the center of the criminal trials that are apt to be the outcome of the Chadwick case.

SECURITIES HELD BY REYNOLDS WORTHLESS. Cleveland, Dec. 10.—The package in the possession of Iri Reynolds, supposed to contain \$5,000,000 of Mrs. Chadwick's securities, was opened Friday. It contained securities with a

face value of \$5,000,000, but with an actual value of not one cent. There was another package containing a security of very small face value, which may or may not have actual value. The "\$5,000,000" package has been in a safety deposit vault in Jersey City until Friday, when it was brought to Cleveland by Iri Reynolds.

Cashier Spear and Director Whitney, of the Citizens' national bank of Oberlin, testified before the grand jury in session here Friday afternoon. Adjournment was taken at 3:30 p. m. Prosecutor Keeler said the testimony showed the Carnegie notes had been uttered in this county, and consequently he had jurisdiction in the case.

New York, Dec. 10.—After a day's wrangling with her counsel as to whether she should waive examination and go to Cleveland, Mrs. Chadwick finally consented to remain another night in the Tombs, but expressed the hope that she might leave there today.

Mrs. Chadwick had made up her mind to ignore the advice of her local counsel, Messrs. Carpenter and Powers, and go to Cleveland to stand trial there, when late in the afternoon she received a telegram from her Cleveland counsel, Judge Albaugh, asking her not to return to Cleveland just yet. This telegram caused her to remain over night.

Mrs. Chadwick was led to her cell in the Tombs by an attendant about 4 o'clock and ate a hearty supper.

WEALTH OF THIS COUNTRY. The Comptroller of the Currency in His Annual Report Says We are the Richest People in the World and Must Continue So.

Washington, Dec. 9.—The annual report of the comptroller of the currency shows that the number of national banks reporting has increased in the past year from 5,118 to 5,412, and the aggregate increase of resources has been from \$6,310,429,906 to \$6,975,086,504, a growth of \$664,656,577.

In the past year 26 national banks were placed in receivers' hands. Six were restored to solvency. Eight of the failures were due to the dishonesty of cashiers.

The business of the building and loan companies was satisfactory, although the aggregate assets show an apparent decrease of \$10,000,000 in Ohio, due to the organization of a number of building associations into trust companies.
