WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our Regular Correspondent.)
Washington, Feb. 4th, 1905.

Editor Press:

President Roosevelt, who has among many other freely expressed convictions that of regarding no time like the present for work, may yet decide that an extra session of Congress in the Spring for legislating on the railway rate question will be advisable. The general impression has been that an extra session would not be called before the early autumn, but no one realized more keenly than the President how insistent the country has become in its demand that something should be done, and quickly in the matter. If the extra session is postponed until fall the result will be more killing of time, and possible postponement of action for another year.

Persons deeply interested in the proposition to authorize the Interstate Commerce Commission to fix railroad rates view with alarm the delay that is likely to take place before any legislation can be effected. With every week of delay the pressure on Congress from outside sources increases and the problem of legislation grows correspondingly more complex. The New York Chamber of Commerce, one of the wealthiest and most powerful organizations in the United States, has opposed the proposition to enlarge the power of the Interstate Commerce Commission to fix rates for the rail roads and in Iowa the Farmers Alliance have hanged in effigy Congressman Hepburn because of his attitude on the question. Washington is over run with representatives of the various rail roads and also the agents of great industrial companies all using the most powerful influence against and for the rate bill. Thus it will be seen that many cooks are helping to make broth which is likely to be spoiled or burned altogether. Congressmen who keep their ears to the ground, and the most patriotic American cannot deny that there are many such, find themselves cruelly confused by the various demands. The President who has been eager for the Senate to act upon rate legislation at this session has nevertheless acceded to their statement that it would be impossible and he had made his official and personal plans with the view of the extra session in October, but realizing the importance of pushing the matter through at the earliest time it may be that he will sacrifice his personal convenience and decide upon a Spring session.

Agricultural interests absorbed the Senate Thursday and for once the farmer was the man of the hour. For almost an entire afternoon the Senate was engaged in a discussion of the policy of distributing ordinary farm and garden seeds from the Agricultural Department through members of Congress. Mr. Lodge and those with him in the debate on the subject that the seeds sent out where the common varieties to be bought of dealers everywhere and urged that only rare varieties should be supplied free to the people. He criticized the appropriation of \$240,000 for supplying seeds which were of the cheapest and commonest varieties. He characterized the whole scheme as a humbug and added, "year after year we are appropriating the people's money for the purpose of making gifts to our constituents. It is a pleasant thing to do, we all like to do it but we should not forget that we are making the country pay for it."
