The State Automobile Law.

The automobile law recently passed by the Pennsylvania Legislature and approved by the Governor, provides that the speed limit in cities and boroughs shall be six miles an hour. On the country roads the limit is three minutes to a mile. This law is daily violated in the rate of speed. All owners of automobiles are required to take out a license, costing \$5, and carry front and back lights. The penalties for violations of this law are fixed at from \$10 to \$25 for the first offense and \$25 to \$100 for the second offense. The fines go to the improvement of the public roads. A good object.
