IS FOR THE TICKET.

DEPUTY ATTORNEY GENERAL SO DECLARES.

Says the Anthracite Region is for Plummer and That There is Nothing to Justify the Prediction of Berryites.

HARRISBURG, Oct. 10.—Deputy Attorney General Fleitz has offered his services on the stump for the Republican state ticket. Mr. Fleitz has been through the state and has no doubt of the election of J. Lee Plummer, Republican candidate for State Treasurer.

"I can speak authoritatively when I say that the entire anthracite coal district of the state is for the Republican ticket as a whole. In 1901, when Coray was a candidate for State Treasurer against Harris, the two big coal counties Lackawanna and Luzerne gave him a majority of 20,000, and yet Harris won out by a big vote. This year these same counties will give Plummer almost as big a majority as they gave Coray.

"In Pittsburg and the rest of Allegheny county I believe Plummer will receive anywhere from 30,000 to 40,000 majority over Berry. The Lincoln party, which is backing Berry, is making no headway outside of Delaware and Chester counties and a few other counties where local conditions are responsible for the split of the regular party.

"Of the Philadelphia situation there is nothing I can say further than what I said at the convention of the State League of Republican Clubs at Easton last month. Philadelphia can take care of itself without interference from up State. When there were local fights up State we received no aid and expected none from Philadelphia, and that is the situation now reversed. But we believe the Republican organization here can take care of itself just as we did."

ALL REFORM PLEDGES HAVE BEEN BROKEN

Mayor Weaver Orders Police and Firemen to Work Against the Republican Ticket.

TAXPAYERS ARE INDENTED

Gordon, a Democrat, Directs the Pay Roll For Politics and the Wanamaker Newspapers Suppress or Distort the News to Suit the Purposes of a Guerilla Combine.

With the mask removed from the so-called reform party in this city, Republicans everywhere cannot but be disgusted with the revelations of hypocrisy, treachery and deceit, and they are going to the polls to cast an emphatic vote of condemnation of the new political combine which is seeking to wreck the Republican party in Philadelphia.

Mayor Weaver is no longer taken seriously in his public statements and he has ceased to have the respect of men who are familiar with the political intrigue which has been under way in this city since Weaver deserted the Republican colors and took his entire administration over to the Wanamaker-Gordon-Van Valkenburg camp, which has for years been the refuge of insurgents and party traitors of all classes and conditions.

A Deep Laid Scheme. The City Party which was started by some well-meaning citizens, who were sincerely desirous of reform, has been captured by the Wanamaker-Gordon-Van Valkenburg combine, and it no longer stands for anything which its original promoters contemplated. Like the Lincoln Party in the state, the City Party has become an asset of Wanamakerism and is being used in a desperate campaign to disrupt the Republican party to further the game which the Wanamaker politicians have in mind for the future.

James Gay Gordon, Democrat, for governor, and John Wanamaker, of doubtful political standing, for United States senator, is the program on the cards of the men who are manipulating the City Party in this city and the Lincoln Party in Pennsylvania.

As in previous campaigns when the Republican party was attacked in the rear by Wanamaker guerrillas and attempts were made to defeat good Republicans, regularly and honestly nominated in accordance with the rules and regulations of the party, the rank and file of the Republican organization stand true and steadfast and are prepared to beat back the insurgent crew to defeat and dismay at the coming election.

In the other Wanamaker campaigns the Republican party was confronted with the most lavish expenditure of money to promote dissension and discord in its ranks and to strengthen the Democratic allies of these insurgents.
