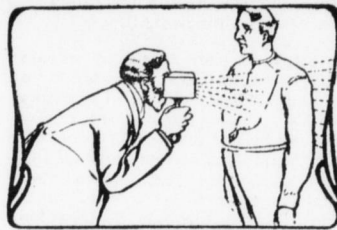
Willson Bros. started a force of men cutting timber and will manufacture lath the balance of the winter. William Logue has charge of the work.
