TO THE REPUBLICAN ELECTORS OF PENNSYLVANIA.
I am directed by the Republican State Committee to announce that the Republicans of Pennsylvania, by their duly chosen representatives, will meet in convention at the Lyceum theatre in the city of Harrisburg, on Wednesday, June 6, 1906, at 10:30 a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following offices:
One person for the office of Governor;

One person for the office of Auditor-General;
One person for the office of Secretary of Internal Affairs; and for the transaction of such other business as may be presented.
In accordance with the rules governing the party, the representation in the State Convention will be based upon the vote polled at the last Presidential election. Under the rules each legislative district is entitled to one delegate for each two thousand votes cast for Republican electors in 1901, and an additional delegate for every fraction of two thousand votes polled in excess of one thousand.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our Regular Correspondent.)
Washington, Feb. 17th, 1906.

The wheels of business stopped in Washington to-day while the daughter of the President was led to the altar. Miss Alice Roosevelt was married to Representative Nicholas Longworth at noon by Bishop Satterlee and all of Washington not bidden to the White House for the ceremony watched and waited while the nuptials were performed. It was the most notable wedding that the capital has ever known. Miss Roosevelt was the twelfth White House bride. This itself was a distinction. But never before has a White House wedding attracted such attention. Never before has there been such a gathering of society people in the mansion and certainly never before has there been such an array of wedding gifts. Every country in the civilized world, even if China is included in that category, was represented in the tributes that were showered on the bride. Representative Longworth too was remembered in a way. But it was not his day. The young Ohio member, who has already won for himself a very fair reputation as a new Congressman was distinctly not in the running. He was an adjunct to the ceremony, but that was all, and that was as it should be. Miss Alice was the object of interest of the day and continued to be till the couple quietly stole away toward evening in an electric brougham for the honeymoon, which it is understood will be spent in a country homestead just outside of Washington.

The Executive offices at the White House were closed all day. There was no business transacted for the first time perhaps since Mr. Roosevelt has been President. Promptly at 10 a. m., the gates of the White House were closed and thereafter there was no entrance without one of the magic admission cards. There were a little short of a thousand guests present, a gathering that crowded to the utmost the East Room where the ceremony was performed. Only ten representatives of the press were present, the three members of the local papers, the three press associations and four personal newspaper friends of Representative Longworth and the President. But society was represented from all quarters of the country. There were the members of the two families, the justices of the Supreme Court and members of the Cabinet, the members of the Senate who had formerly held cabinet positions, and the general run of invited guests who included most of the people of prominence whose names usually appear in the society columns of the New York papers.

The service was brief but impressive as the words and the occasion warranted. The party moved almost immediately afterward to the breakfast room where there was a buffet luncheon for the most of the guests in the Blue Room. The newly married couple, President and Mrs. Roosevelt and about sixty of the guests sat down to the wedding breakfast in the Green Room. The breakfast lasted well into the afternoon. Then came the most interesting and least advertised part of the performance. Mr. Longworth and his bride quietly effaced themselves and left the house in an electric brougham, one of a dozen precisely alike, that were parked back of the White House. In it they drove away to the country house where they will spend the honeymoon.
