An Ordinance, No. 48.

Providing for the levy and assessment of an annual tax of three mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of the taxable property in the Borough of Emporium, to provide for the payment of the principle and interest and state tax upon the bonded indebtedness of the Borough of Emporium, authorized by Ordinance approved the 12th day of January, A. D. 1906 and with the assent of the electors of said Borough obtained at an election held on the 20th day of February, 1906.

Section 1. The Council of the Borough of Emporium does ordain that for the purpose of complying with the provisions of the Act of Assembly of April 20, 1874 and its supplements, there is hereby laid and assessed upon all property real and personal in said Borough as shall be subject to taxation for county rates and levies and for other Borough purposes an annual tax of three mills on the dollar upon the assessed value of the present assessed valuation and upon any change in the assessed valuation in lieu thereof so many mills as will produce nine hundred dollars annually and said levy and assessment to be exclusively applied to and being sufficient for the payment within fifteen years of the interest and principle and state tax on the bonded indebtedness of seven thousand dollars authorized by ordinance approved the 12th day of January, 1906 and with the assent of the electors of said Borough obtained at an election held on the 20th day of February, 1906.

Section 2. The moneys arising from such taxes shall be annually and as fast as the same accumulate to the redemption at par and payment of interest and state taxes upon the outstanding bonds given to secure the indebtedness incurred to extend the public and common sewers of said Borough.
