G. R. Crawford Seeks Release.

The United States circuit court of appeals in Philadelphia heard argument last Thursday on a writ of habeas corpus to secure the release of George R. Crawford, of Cameron county, who is held by Sheriff William Riddell, of Lycoming county.

Crawford is charged with attempting to evade the payment of a verdict amounting to \$27,710.60 obtained against him and Walter S. Yothers, by Maria P. Johnson, New Jersey.

Crawford, it is alleged, secreted his property in violation of the law and left the jurisdiction of the court. On his return he was taken into custody and committed to the Lycoming county jail on a commitment issued by Judge Archbald, of the United States circuit court, of the middle district of Pennsylvania.

Judge Archbald based his action on the Pennsylvania insolvency act of 1842. The defense contends this law has been superseded by the national bankruptcy act and that Crawford's arrest is illegal. The prisoner was remanded to the custody of the sheriff pending decision of the court.
