Moved by Mr. Hamilton, seconded by Mr. Marshall, that exonerations asked for by Collector Glenn amounting to \$4.25 be granted. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Marshall seconded by Mr. Norris, that a committee be appointed to confer with Emporium Water Co., in regard to contract for use of water for Borough purposes. Carried.

The President appointed Messrs. Marshall, Goodnough and Norris as Committee.

Moved by Mr. Norris, seconded by Mr. Mumford, that Secretary notify the Telephone Company to take out license on telephone poles and wires thereon as provided by ordinance, or that the Borough will collect fines as provided by ordinance. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Goodnough, seconded by Mr. Marshall, that Secretary purchase three dozen spanners for 2 1/2 inch hose. Carried.
