Senator Knox.

WASHINGTON, March 30th, (Special). The appalling loss of life in the coal mines of this country is to be stopped if the government of the United States can accomplish it. Congress has voted an appropriation of \$95,000 for the purpose of conducting investigations to ascertain the cause of mine explosions, and once the cause is found, the means of preventing them is easy.

Senator Knox of Pennsylvania insisted that this investigation must not be confined to the territories as was first proposed, but that the government experts in seeking information must have an unlimited field. It was contended that the amendment of the Pennsylvania Senator was an invasion of state rights, but Mr. Knox denied this. He argued that the Federal Government had a right to gather information anywhere it pleased. Said he: "The loss of life and accidents in the United States far exceed those of any other country where the mining industry is being conducted. This proposed investigation is for the purpose of allowing the hundreds of thousands of men who toil in the darkness beneath the surface of the earth to get the benefit of all the protection that all the knowledge gathered from all possible sources will furnish."

Senator Knox's proposition was adopted and the result will be a broad, thorough investigation by government experts that will bring about the adoption of safety methods in mining that will save thousands of lives and millions of property.
