# HUDSON-FULTON CELEBRATION NEW YORK CITY.

Three hundred years ago, Henry Hudson, an Eng-lishman in command of a Dutch expedition, with eighteen men, explored the Hudson River from Sandy Hook to Troy in his small craft, the "Half Moon." One hundred and ninety-eight years later, Robert

Fulton established, with his steamboat, the "Clermont," a regular water service between New York and the towns along the Hudson river to the North. This year, New York City, with sister cities and towns along the Hudson, will celebrate these two achieves-ments by a series of imposing observances, religious, historical, military, naval, musical and literary, extending a from September 25 to October 9. Replicas of the "Half Moon" and the "Clermont" have been built and will play a large part of the celebra-tion. They will be the center of attraction in the great naval pageant on Saturday, September 25. The United States Government will have fifty-two war ships anchored in the Under in the Hudson, and Great Britaiu, France, the Netherlands, Italy, Germany, Argentine, Guatemala, Mexico, and Cuba will be represented by war vessels. Two great parades of water craft will escort the "Half Moon" and the "Clermont" in triumphal procession
