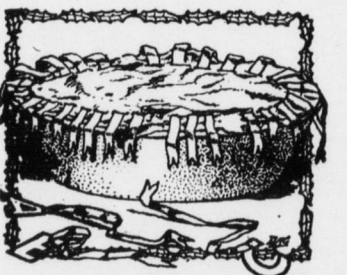
CHRISTMAS PIES.
