him at the Parish House, Wednesday evening, June 1st between the hours of eight and ten."

The resignation, coming as it did was a surprise to the community, is universally regretted. During the fourteen years that this excellent gentleman has been associated with our towns people, Rev. Robertson has to a very marked degree aided in the up-building of every laudable project. His services were always cheerfully given and his pen readily flowed for the advancement of every cause he thought to be right, without fear or favor. Personally THE PRESS shall always remember his many courtesies and unselfish, kind words of cheer and comfort. Emporium is losing the most talented clergyman and polished gentleman within its confine and his place will be one hard to fill.

Rev. Mr. Robertson will go to Monticelli, N. Y., where his family are now ocated, to take a long needed rest, where we hope he may happily enjoy the delightful resort, among his relatives and friends.

The following, copied from the Elmira, N. Y., Star-Gazette of Feb. 22, 1910, can at this time be be copied very appropriately:

"This handsome edifice at Emporium is now under the rectorship of the Rev. James Marion Robertson, who was born near Thorald, Ont., in 1866. His grandfather came from Scotland in 1830, and his father was the Rev. John L. Robertson, a Presbyterian divine. An uncle, the late Dr. Hugh Robertson, was a professor of anatomy in Teinity. was a professor of anatomy in Trinity Medical School, Toronto. Another un-cle, Mr. Emerson Coatsworth, has twice served as mayor of Toronto. Mr.

Robertson was graduated from West-minister College (Pa.) in 1895, A. B., with highest honors. He was principal for one year of an academy in Lancas-ter county and spent a year at the Uni-ted Presbyterian Theological Seminary

ter county and spent a year at the United Presbyterian Theological Seminary at Allegany, Pa.

In 1892 he was graduated from Princeton Theological Seminary. He was pastor of the Presbyterian Church at White Lake, Sullivan county N. Y., from 1892 to 1894. He became a candidate for orders in the diocese of New York, and was ordained to the deconate by the late Bishop Henry C. Potter in December, 1894. He was in mission work in the diocese of Pittsburg, and was advanced to the priesthood by Bishop Whitehead in December, 1895. He was called to the rectorship of Emmanuel Church, Emporium, Pa., in 1896, where he has since labored with gratifying success. The present beautiful church building was erected in 1901-3 of Medina sandstone at a cost of \$21,000. Four years ago a new pipe organ costing \$3,000, was installed. It is expected soon to add new furnishings in the chancel. The old church building has changed to a Sanday school room and parish house. There are now about 140 confirmed persons in ings in the chancel. The old church building has changed to a Sanday school room and parish house. There are now about 140 confirmed persons in membership, and through his efforts the church has grown to be potent for great good. The last confimation class numbered 27, the largest in the history of the parish. The Hon. B. W. Green, lately president judge of the 25th judicial district, and the Hon. Josiah Howard are the wardens of the parish. The Rev. Mr. Robertson is a pastor of strong intellectuality. He has read deeply in ancient and modern philosophy, and stands on the solid ground of substantial faith, rather than that of blind belief. With him Christian revelation is not an arbitary theological scheme, but the natural outcome of a harmonious system uniting the natural man with the spiritual energizing nature of the Divine Father. He has been a leader in the liberal movement in the church, and has written considerably on religious questions, one of his papers being entitled, The Incarnation of God." He is a broad-minded scholar and a devout Christian and a faithful pastor. He is one of the examining chaplains of the Archdeaconry of Erie, and is the county superintendent under the State Sunday School Association. He is also chaplain of Companies L and M of the Pifth Pennsylvania Regiment of the United Boys' Brigades of America. He was married in 1892 to Miss Evalena Porter of New Wilmington, Pa., who died three month after their marriage. In 1895 he married Miss Annie Van Antwerp of Monticello, N. Y., the representative of and old Dutch family. He has four daughters."
