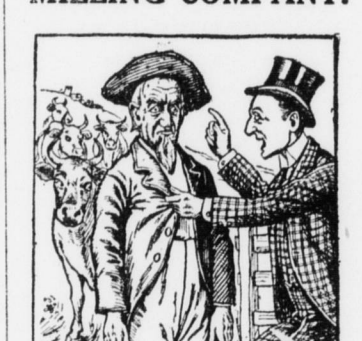
J. H. Moorehouse, of Pittsburg, and Roy Branson are visiting relatives and friends in town.
