Summary of the Week's News of the World.

Happenings From All Parts of the Globe Put into Shape For Easy Reading—What All the World is Talking About—Cream of the News Culled From Long Dispatches.

Thursday.
Fifteen cases of cholera or suspected cholera have been discovered in Berlin and in Spandau, a suburb; the mortality in St. Petersburg is decreasing.
Chilian specifications for two new battleships set forth that the guns and some of the machinery must of English manufacture, thereby practically eliminating American tenders.
Reports from San Juan del Sur said that a large part of Nicaragua was still held by the troops of Madrid; the American brigade which supported Estrada has reached Managua.
For the first time in Maryland the Democratic and Republican parties selected nominees for representatives in congress by ballot, as opposed to the convention system.

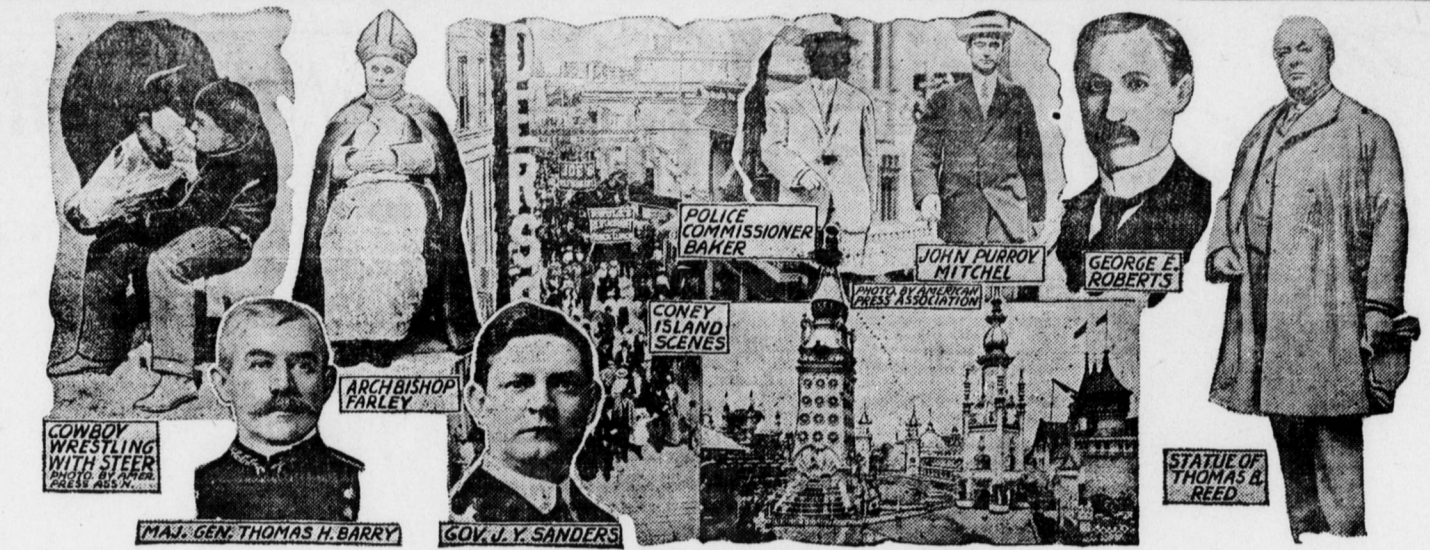
Friday.
General Juan Estrada was inaugurated president of Nicaragua at Managua the troops have been paid off, and the country is quiet General Mena has been chosen minister of war.
Medical authorities at Berlin announced that no cases of cholera existed in the city.
Leon Morane in his monoplane flight last Monday reached a height of 7,054 feet, a world's record.
Mrs. A. E. Buckingham of San Francisco was killed by a runaway motor car in Munich; Miss Alwine Goodrich was killed.
A bronze statue of Thomas B. Reed was unveiled at Portland, Me.
The treasury department at Washington announced that the general stock of money in the United States was nearly \$3,500,000,000.

Saturday.
Lord Kilmarnock, one of the King George's shooting party at Balmoral, received four pellets through the accidental discharge of a gun; his injuries were not serious.
Cardinal Vannutelli, papal legate to the Eucharistic congress to be held at Montreal, received an enthusiastic welcome at Quebec.
The Spanish government declared Bilbao in a state of siege on account of the rioting resulting from the local strike.
The expulsion of Jews from Kiev and other points in Russia outside the Jewish pale continues, though on a modified scale.
The special grand jury reported at Newark, O., that the mayor and other city officials, who have since resigned or been deposed, could have prevented the lynching of Carl Etherington.

Monday.
Leon Morane reached a height of 8,471 feet in an aeroplane, he had a narrow escape from death, owing to the stoppage of his motor.
Over 2,000 first class passengers sailed on nine steamers from England for the United States.
France has decided to rearm its infantry with a new rifle at a cost of \$120,000,000.
The cholera scourge on Russia is reported to be diminishing; an increase in deaths is reported from Apulia.
It was announced by the census bureau in Washington that the population of Philadelphia is 1,549,008, a gain in the last decade of 253,311, or 19.7 per cent.

Tuesday.
The appointment of Count de Tovar as ambassador from Portugal to the Vatican was announced from Lisbon.
German English designers are reported from Berlin to be working on plans for "cruiser destroyers," a new type of battleship which it is claimed will outclass the Dreadnoughts.
Placards posted in Barcelona proclaimed a general strike in sympathy with striking coal miners, dock workers and teamsters.
Urged by President Taft, H. S. Wise, the United States attorney at New York is hurrying along the suit to dissolve the combination in which is the American Sugar Refining company.
Mayor Gaynor of New York city was out for several hours in a yacht on Long Island sound.

Wednesday.
The condition of King Manelek of Abyssinia is reported to be improved.
The murder of a policeman, his wife and six children, near Reggio di Calabria, Italy, is ascribed to the vengeance of the Black Hand society of New York.
The striking coal miners at Bilbao and Saragossa, Spain, returned to work.
James J. Hill, in an address in Portland, Ore., said that unless new methods were introduced on the farms the United States would soon cease to be self-supporting so far as food is concerned.
Cardinal Gibbons, in an interview in Baltimore, said that social unrest was due largely to the lack of economy on the part of Americans.
