HOWARD SIDING.

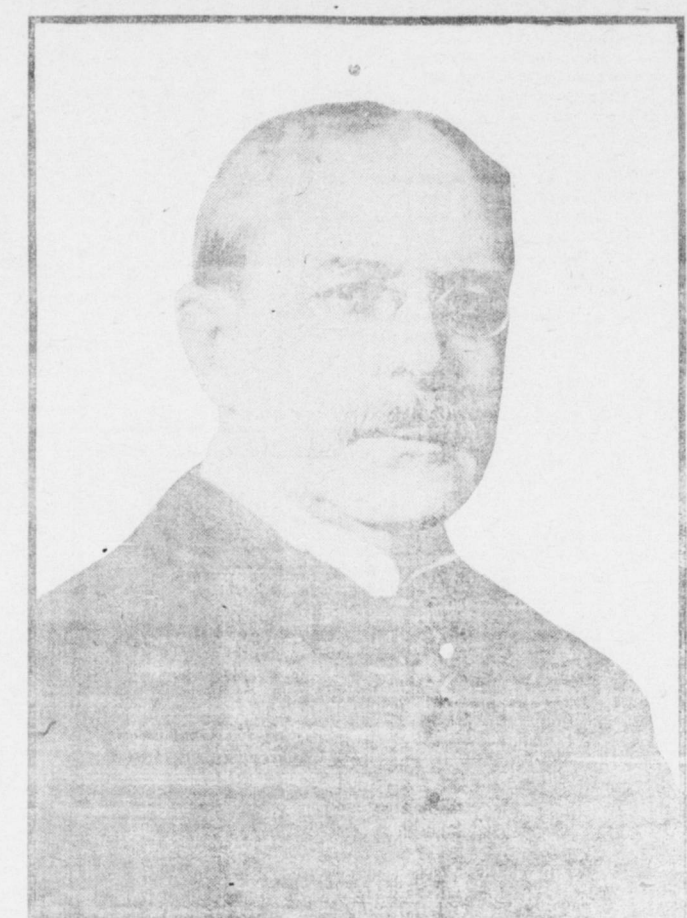
