

LATE NEWS ITEMS.

William Ward, an engineer on a Wisconsin railroad, saved the life of a child a few days since by jumping off and seizing it just as the train was about to pass over it.

Kansas is unfortunate. Lucy Stone and others of her type have been scouring the State, and had no sooner left, than devouring swarms of grasshoppers pitched upon it.

The people of New London, Conn., are excited by a report that Captain Silas Buchanan and wife, and Riley West of that city, supposed to have been lost at sea fifteen years ago, are alive on a Pacific Island.

It appears that infanticide prevails to a great extent among the freed negroes. In Columbia, Mississippi, nine babies were found in one well. In this what Sheridan means when he says "the freed-men are doing well enough!"

The Clover Hill coal mines, in Virginia, which were the scenes of such terrible explosions recently, will soon be in working order. The fire has been extinguished, and the preparations to resume work are being made rapidly.

Young Surratt seems to have the whole of the Mongrel Congress, all the Mongrel newspapers and a considerable portion of the thieves and jail-birds about Washington, engaged in a "conspiracy" to hang him. It seems to be a popular idea with the Mongrel party, that it is necessary to hang the son to justify the murder of the mother.

Niagara Falls is to be excited over a female Blondin before many days, in the person of M'de Rosa Celeste, whose thrilling feats in rope walking in California have exceeded those of Blondin. Mr. De Young, her agent, is at Niagara Falls, making the necessary arrangements for M'de Celeste, who intends walking a rope stretched across the river below the Falls. The walking will take place as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made. This daring feat will no doubt call out a large attendance.

Samuel Cope, formerly a resident of the Quaker City, and a man of wealth, committed suicide in the township of Falls, Bucks county, Pa., a short time ago, by taking laudanum. He was a morose, melancholy man. The suicide of Preston King, which was induced by remorse consequent upon his rough refusal to permit Miss Annie Surratt to intercede with the President for the life of her mother, made a deep impression upon Cope's morbid feelings, and was the frequent subject of conversation.

Dye, the witness who was troubled with dreams, and who remembered Surratt's face because he had "frequently seen it in sleep," it appears was arrested in Philadelphia in the early part of the present year for passing counterfeit money. Cleaver, another witness, has been lately convicted for rape and murder, and is now at large on bail awaiting a new trial. Hobart and Blinn, other witnesses, have contradicted outside what they said in court, and the negro wench who said she saw Surratt at his mother's house on the evening of the assassination saw him but a few minutes, and had never seen him before or since, until confronted with him in court.

A singular circumstance happened at Wellsburg, West Virginia, on Monday, 17th, about midday. At that hour a bright blaze was discovered rising from the roof of Marks' cabinet shop, which was quenched without any alarm being given; and on the spot Mr. Marks found a piece of material about the size of a saucer, resembling lava, or the substance that escapes from the furnaces, cellular, sulphurous to the smell, and not very heavy, which he threw on the pavement, burning his fingers in the act. The blaze was undoubtedly caused by this substance, and the mystery is—what it is, and how did it get there? There was no fire in the shop, or any place near, from which it could have found its way upon the roof, and the general opinion is that the substance is an aerolite, and came hissing hot from the atmospheric regions. The specimen is preserved as a curiosity.
