ORDINANCE of the Borough of Carrolltown, passed at a meeting of the Town Council, held July 6th, 1867: SEC. 1. Be it enacted by the Council of the Borough of Carrolltown, and it is hereby enacted by authority of the same, That from and after the date of this Ordinance any person or persons fighting within the limits of said Borough, shall, upon conviction thereof before the Burgess or acting Burgess, be fined in a sum not less than five nor more than ten dollars each, and the costs of such

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted. That any person guilty of drunkenness, disorderly, boisterous or unruly conduct, or gross misbehavior, shall be subject to a penalty, upon conviction thereof before the Burgess or acting Burgess, of not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars, and the costs of such conviction. And any person guilty of swearing, or using lond blasphemous or obscene language in public, within the limits of said Borough, shall be subject, upon conviction, to a like penalty.

On any day of public excitement, or on any day likely to attract large or unusual crowds or unruly persons to the Borough, the Burgess shall have full power to appoint as many policemen, for the preservation of the peace, as he may deem necessary-such policemen to receive such compensation as may be allowed in the discretion of the Burgess.
