OBITUARY.

It is with feelings of deep regret we ansice the death of Mr. William Rods de, of this city. The respected deceased departed this life at his residence, No. 275 West Eleventh street, on the 5th instant and in the sixty-seventh year of his age. At half-past nine o'clock on the morning of the 7th inst., the remains were conveyed to St. Joseph's Church, Sixth avenue, where a Solemn Mass of Requiem was celebrated by the Rev. Thomas Farrell, the Most Rev. Archbishop, Very Rev. Mr. Starrs, V. G., and many of the Reverend elergy being present. There was also a numerous attendance of the relatives and friends of the family of the deceased. At the conclusion of the Mass absolution was pronounced by the Archbishop, after which the remains were conveyed to the cemetary at Fordham College, where they were deposited in the same vault in which repose the re-

mains of his daughter,

Mr. Bedrigue was a native of Philadelphia, and was of French descent. At the close of his collegiate education he visited France, and during his three years' stay devoted himself to the study of art with the view of adopting it as his profession. On his return he entered the office of Mr. Strickland, the well-known Philadelphia architect, and was connected with the erection of the United States Bank. He was subsequently engaged in surveying expeditions through the States of Pennsylvania and Virginia, and also in Canada. Among his works while living in Philadelphia he furnished the plan and designs of St. John's Church, of which the late illustrious Archbishop of New York was pastor. In the year 1838 he removed to New York with his family, and resumed the practice of his profession in this city. The Church of St. Francis Xavier, in Sixteenth street, was built on his plans and specifications, as was also the Chur. h of the Immaculate Conception, in Fourteenth street. In both instances, however, the limited means at command compelled a modification of the original design. We should state here that the very fine addition to the old St. Patrick's Cathedral, a work which was universally admired for its beauty of design and architectural finish, was made by the deceased. The last important work with which the late Mr. Rodrigue was connected was the new St. Patrick's Cathedral. Mr. Rodrigue was related to the late Archbishop of New York, baving been married to the sister of that distinguished prelate-a lady who is beloved and respected by all who possess the honor of her friendship or acquaintance. The deceased gentleman was earnestly devoted to his profession, too much so to fall in with the style of the present day-a style in which the substantial and the artistic is too often sacrificed to less worthy considerations. As a man, he was esteemed by all who knew him for his integrity of JOHN TURNER, Publisher and Proprieter, character, his courteous demeanor, and the virtues of a true Christian gentleman.
