

A SPANISH DREAM AND ITS FULFILLMENT.—Among the victims of the late Angora disaster was a Mr. J. P. Hayward, of State Lane, who was in the employ of the Railroad Company as its agent at that place. The Patienceville (C.) Advertiser gives an account of a strange dream—for the correctness of which it vouches—which Mr. A. had just six months before he lost his life. It says: "He dreamed that he was away from home, in a desert, when suddenly he heard a terrible crash, and upon looking in the direction from which the sound proceeded he saw a bright light, which seemed to reach to the very heavens, and he heard screams and yells of the most frightful and heart-rending character. On looking about him he saw an august personage—a monk, he thought—sitting in high estate, and he inquired where all that noise came from. 'From hell,' answered the monk. The dreamer asked, 'What does it mean?' The monk replied, 'It means that you must instantly die.' Mr. H. then told the monk that he was not yet prepared to die, and begged for further time. The monk finally said, 'your prayer is granted; you may live upon the earth six months longer; at the expiration of that time you shall die.' At this juncture Mr. Hayward was awakened by his wife, who was alarmed at her husband's actions, he sitting up in bed and being greatly agitated. "The next paper speaking of it adds: 'The dream made a great impression upon his mind and was the subject of much thought and frequent conversation with his friends for a time, but at length he came to look upon it as of no consequence. On the very last day of the six months he purchased a life insurance ticket for \$3,000, and took passage on the ill-fated train for Buffalo, and was numbered among the victims at Angora!'"

BERSE OR SCALDS.—In the St. Louis Medical Reporter we find the following prescription for this painful accident. It is especially useful when the scuffle or scurf has become acute to a considerable extent: "Take one drachm of finely powdered alum and mix thoroughly with the white of two eggs and one teaspoonful of fresh lard spread on a cloth, and apply to the parts burnt. It gives almost instant relief from pain, and by excluding the air, prevents excessive inflammatory action. The application should be changed at least once a day. While on the subject, we give another formula for an application to burns: In severe cases, clear creosote may be employed, followed by a dressing to consist of creosote one drachm (a teaspoonful), aintment is sufficiently strong for most cases. On the concurrent testimony of several physicians headed by Dr. O. E. Brewster, the suggester of the remedy, it almost immediately and completely relieves the pain and swarming."

A GOOD SEED STORY.—The Connecticut Reporter says: "An accident of a remarkable character occurred in the woods at Denmark one day last week. A man was standing on a balance tree across a large log, to see another tree come down, when the tree in its falling course struck the other end of the one on which he was standing, and the tremendous weight of it falling on the spring lever, threw him, like a shot, into the air. When at his highest elevation the man caught hold of a limb in the top of a tree, and remained suspended by the arms until the person who had fallen the tree traveled two miles to the nearest house and returned with a ladder to release him from his perilous position. He was not injured by his sudden and rapid flight, but took the matter as an ordinary occurrence."

INSURANCE OF THE TURTLE.—It has been observed that turtles carry the ocean from the Bay of Honduras to the Cayman Isles, near Jamaica, a distance of 450 miles, with an accuracy superior to the chart and compass of human skill, for it is affirmed that vessels which have lost their latitude in hazy weather have steered entirely by the noise of the turtles in swimming.
