DAVIS AND LINTON.

The Democratic State Convention, to meet at Harrisburg on the 4th of March next, among its other duties, will nominate candidates for Auditor General and Surveyor General of Pennsylvania.

Whatever claims other candidates may possess, it seems to us that our standard-bearer of 1855 should again receive the nomination.

Especially is Col. Linton entitled to a re-nomination. When formerly nominated he was but little known throughout the State, excepting for his military services.

As a Democrat his course has been unwavering, on all occasions standing up for the integrity of Democratic principles—never yielding to expediency—never dodging any of the great issues of the day.

As to Genry's change of politics, that has nothing to do with his personal course. He changed repeatedly, but not about the year '61, for a few weeks before he was nominated for Governor by the Rules in 1866, if he is to be believed himself, he was a Democrat.

NEWS OF THE WEEK.

The Democracy of Tionesta, Venango county, elected their burgess and town council on Monday—the first victory since the town has been a borough.

A negro at Fort Porter, New York, attempted to walk one hundred miles in one hundred consecutive hours, the other day, but fell dead at the fifty-seventh hour.

More than \$22,000 was paid by the estate of the late Peter Leffland as internal revenue tax on legacies. This is the largest tax of the kind ever collected in this country.

A former named E. W. Dixon, of Pittsylvania County, Virginia, was reduced to beggary a few nights since by being robbed of \$3,000—the amount received from the sale of his farm but one day previous.

Miss Kettie Bishop, who stumped Kansas in behalf of women suffrage has come over to the Democratic party, and is now lecturing on "The Failure and Hope," meaning the failure of the Republicans to save the country, and the hope that the Democrats will.

The Mankato (Minn.) Union says that in South Bend, recently, a man over eighty years of age was married to a Swedish girl of twenty years of age.

A correspondent of the New York Tribune, shocked at the terrible and, as he says, needless torture of criminals by hanging, suggests that hereafter they may be made to touch a wire communicating with twelve Leyden jars, when death by electricity would be instantaneous and painless.

At the explosion of the Harry Dean, on the Ohio river, recently, one of the bodies on board was so frightened that the hair on one side of her head instantly turned white, while that on the other side retained its natural color.

In August last Mitchell being absent, as also was his sister at a neighboring house—a worthless scoundrel came to their house, whose advances the young lady had rather scornfully repulsed, and hired a negro man to send a negro boy to tell Miss Mitchell that a lady had called to see her, and desired her to return home.

WARRING AGAINST THE DEAD.—The New York Tribune says: "It is said that Gov. Geary withholds the Pennsylvania appropriation from the Antislavery Cemetery because the Maryland authorities have made provision for burying the rebel dead therein."
