We believe it is now generally admitted that the mouse never sings only when he suffers the most neute agony, The cause of his suffering is a parasite in the liver; this parasite bores its way into the delicate organ, making it the sent of pain; and when in deep distress, the little animal crovches down and gives atterance to a soft, plaintive cry, resembling in carlence a low, bird-like song. It is pleasant to think that from the very depths of woe and misery often bubble up the sweetest harmonies.

CALVES, -It is more humane, and better policy besides, to take away the calf. which is to be removed in a few days at farthest, as soon as it is dropped. The cow "takes on" less, and the calf does not mind the separation at all. It will learn to drink from a pail readily. Its diet at first must be its dam's new milk, and then any sweet milk; after the first week it may be changed gradually to skimmed milk with a little oil meal gruel, or a thin porridge of wheat middlings mingled with it-the quantity of meal being increased as it grows, and that of milk lessened. Scours may usually be checked by a little scalded fine flour porridge, and constipation by oil meal. Young calves should be fed four times a day, dividing the periods equally between 5 or 6.0'clock in the morning and 9 or 10 at night. After a few days three times a day will be enough.

The penetrating qualities of the glycerine enable it to separate the granules of which the membranes are formed in both these diseases, and not only destroy them but prevent their further formation. These are two most insidious and terribly fatal diseases, and if this simple and harmless remedy will cure them, it should be generally known. Glycerine is a most valuable medicine, and should be kept in every house. It is a perfect remedy for chapped hands, lips, or other chafed, raw surfaces, curing them by simply applying a small quantity to the part affected.

Poisons in Daily Use.-Pickles are often poisoned by being scalded in brass or copper kettles; it makes them look green, but that green renders them poisonous. Brass or copper vessels ought not to be used for any purpose, unless they are scoured very bright; it is better for health to avoid their use for cooking purposes. Brass wash dishes ought never to be used; they cause sore eyes, etc. Water is poisoned by being conveyed in lead pipes, or standing in pails painted on the incide. Milk is poisoned by using such pails for milking. Cheese is often poisoned in this way, and by using in its manu-facture brass copper or wooden tube facture brass, copper or wooden tubs
