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
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certaining the fact, that the Southern States accepted the results of the war in good faith -that they were willing to abide by the terms of Lee's surrender, and might safuly be permitted to govern themselves. From that time till the present the Freedmen's Bureau and the standing army have been maintained in these States by Mr. Morrell and his confreres in Congress, at a cost of upwards of one hundred millions a year, assessed upon all the Northern people excepting the bondholders.

And even now, when a portion of those States are fully admitted, even by the slow process of Radical reconstruction, the standing army and the Freedmen's Bureau still remain, and will remain by Mr. Morrell's vote until after the next election, at a further cost of over fifty millions, because the act of the Radical Rump does not provide for their discontinuance before the first of January next, in order that they may be used in the meantime to aid in the election to the Presidency of the General of the army. And even this limit would not have been placed upon it were it not that before the expiration of the time fixed the Rump will be again in session, and will continue the Bureau and the army, as ft has heretofore done.

The trathful Tribune says the "military governments are being removed." Which one, pray? Which of the ten Southern States is not under military rule to-day? "Why not be honest," Mr. Tr.Bune ?

You say that General Price of Missouri, who was a delegate to the Democratic Convention, was a rebel General. Our recollection is that he was a Union General. "Why don't you be honest ?"

You say that "Seymour always opposed the war and sympathized with the South." Gov. Seymour sent more men to the field than any Governor in the Union, and President Lincoln warmly thanked him for his prompt assistance in furnishing men to put down the rebellion. But since you have abjured Lincoln's peaceful policy his word may not pass current with you .---Still, "why not be honest ?"
