ELECTION OF ELECTORS OF A PRESIDENT AND VICE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES.

Pursuant to an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act relating to the Elections of this Commonwealth for President and Vice President of the United States," the 24th day of August, A. D. 1868, J. JOHN A. BLAIR, High Sheriff of the County of Cambria, in the State of Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the county aforesaid, that a GENERAL ELECTION, will be held in said county of Cambria, Pennsylvania, on the

1st Tuesday, 3d day of November, 1868, at which time TWENTY SIX ELECTORS of a President and a Vice President of the United States are to be elected.

And further give notice, as in and by the 12th Section of the Act aforesaid, that all persons excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the government of the United States, or of any State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether by contract, or otherwise, a subordinate or agent, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, judicial or executive departments of this State or the United States, or any city or incorporated district; also, that every member of Congress and the State Legislature, and of the select and common councils of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector or Judge, or other officer of any such election, shall be eligible to any office to be voted for. Also, in the 14th Section of the Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to Elections and for the better regulation thereof," approved the 10th day of April, 1856, it is enacted that the foregoing 12th Section shall not be so construed as to prevent any military officer or borough officer from serving as Judge or Inspector at any general or special elections in the Commonwealth.

Also, that in the 61st Section of said Act it is enacted that "every general and special election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten o'clock in the forenoon, and shall continue without interruption or adjournment, until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed.

The general, special, city, incorporated district and township elections, and all elections for electors of President and Vice President of the United States, shall be held and conducted by the Inspectors and Judges elected as aforesaid, and by Clerks appointed as hereinafter provided.

No person shall be permitted to vote at any election, as aforesaid, but a white freeman, of the age of twenty-one years or more, who has resided in this State at least one year, and in the election district where he offers to vote at least ten days immediately preceding such election, and within two years paid a State or County tax which shall have been assessed at least ten days before the election. But a citizen of the United States, who has previously been a citizen of this State and who has resided in and returned, and who shall have resided in the election district and paid taxes as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote after residing in this State six months. Provided, that the white freeman of the age of twenty-one and twenty-two years, as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote, although they shall not have paid taxes.

In case the person who shall have received the highest number of votes for Inspector shall not attend on the day of election, the
