A CONTRAST.

The New York World, speaking of the Ecumenical Council at Rome and the Free Thinkers' Convention at Naples, puts the matter aptly in this way :

The Ecumenical Council at Rome and the Free Thinkers' Council at Naples both commence their session to-day. It is with no disrespect to either of these assemblages that we thus mention both of them in the same sentence. The Free-Thinkers selected the 8th of December for their meeting with the express purpose of sharpening the contrast which the world in any event would perceive between their assemblage and that of the bishops at Rome. The contrast would have been sufficiently distinct without this addition to the colors of the picture. The coun cil in Rome is composed of seven or eight handred men, gathered together from every land under heaven; the Naples gathering will consist of a few Italians, a few Frenchmen, a few Germans, and probably a stray Englishman or American. The bishops come together to pray, and their first act will be to unite in the celebration of the august mysteries of their faith; the free-thinkers, if one may judge by the proclamation of Garibaldi summoning them to assemble, come together to curse, and their first act. should they venture to follow his advice would be to sack the churches of Naples and break up the confessional boxes for fuel for the poor. The bishops will spend weeks. and perhaps months, of anxious and prudent deliberation over the interests of a church in whose communion by the far larger half of Christendom is embraced; the free thinkers can scarcely find it profitable or pleasant to devote themselves for more than a day or two to mutual exhortation and encouragement. What it is that the free-thinkers propose to accomplish by their council seems ccarcely to be known; but the signs of the times are not such as to afford them any great encouragement. That there is a deep and significant change in the religious feeling of the world, or of portions of the world, cannot be denied; but it is not such a change as that to which they invite markind. Men may be induced to abandon one faith for another; but those among them who give up all faith are very few indeed. This is a time of surprises, and perhaps recent events prevented very much surprise being felt by those who read the letter of approval addressed to the Naples Free-Thinkers by the Rev. Mr. Frothingham, which we printed yesterday. But Mr. Frothingham, although far advanced, is scarcely up to the mark which the Naples Convention will probably reach.

Tobacco has really been applied to useful purpose, lock-jaw having been, in one instance, at least, cured by it. A soldier in Illinois was wounded in the foot, and, having taken cold in it, lockjaw ensued. No medicines could be procored, and, as death seemed inevitable, an experiment was tried by one of the officers. He cut off a piece of tobacco about three inches square, put it in a mess pan with boiling water until it was neated through and saturated with the water; allowing it to cool, so as not to blister, he then flattened it out, and placed it on the pit of the man's stomach. In about five minutes the patient turned white about the lips, which also began to twitch, and in nine or ten minutes his jaws fell open. Indeed, it seemed as if the patient would fall apart, so utterly was his whole system relaxed The tobacco was immediately removed, and some whisky-gruel given to stimulate him. The next day the man was able to be carried in an ambulance, and was soon convalescent. In lock-jaw it seems necessary to produce nausea that the rigid muscles may relax, and tobacco, applied externally, has this effect. The remedy, however, is very powerful, and should be applied with extreme caution.
