

THIRTY YEARS SINCE.

In 1831, and part of 1832, the writer, then studying in the schools of the world renowned Paris...

In the summer of 1832, this artist was on his way home in one of the fine ships of the Havre and New York line. Steam did not, in those days, puff the traveler on his homeward path across the grand Atlantic in seven or eight days, and adverse winds not infrequently protracted the voyage far beyond the endurance of impatient men, longing for home, for fame, and for fortune.

As last a fellow-passenger, whose studies had also been going on in that grand old city, Paris, and who like the painter, was returning home with head and heart both filled, like his, with hopes of greatness, and the dreams of achieving it, and whose career has been highly successful, brought on deck his scientific apparatus, and proposed to stop off an hour or two from the tedious time by exhibiting experiments. Electricity and galvanism contributed their quota. In one of these experiments the effect produced was seen at a considerable distance from the instrument that was working.

This remark seemed to pass away, like the flash that had occasioned it, for no further reference was made to it, but it was a seed that had fallen on good ground, and in due time it sprang up and bore fruit million fold.

Arrived in New York, the emigre passengers separated. But nothing was heard of the ambitious painter, whose copy of the "Shipwreck" had spread his fame abroad of him.

What could be more aggravating to a man of functions and tender toes, than that of finding his socks starched and shirt collar limber? The process of "canning eggs" in their own shell is something new. It was explained at a late meeting of the New York Farmers' Club. When two or three dozen of eggs are obtained from the nests, place them in a dish and pour scalding water over them, and immediately turn it off. This process is repeated three times, by which means the albumen is fixed or coagulated, the pores of the shell closed, and the eggs, as it were, "canned in its own covering." The eggs thus prepared are then packed in salt, with the apex downward, and they are said to keep perfectly fresh for many months.
