Why, thar was me, Jones, and Bob Lee, Harry and Ben-- No-account men; Then to take him! Well, thar--Good bye-- No more, sir--I-- Eh? What's that you say? Why, dern it--sho!-- No? Yes? By Jo! S'it! Sold! Why, you limb, You orrery. Burt'd old Long-legged Jim!

A MISS NOT A MISS. Mrs. Dr. Walker, having occasion recently to pass up the Missouri river, was interviewed at New Madrid by the editor of the Record, and in the course of her conversation the Doctor related the following incident of her war experience in Georgia:

I frequently rode outside of our lines and visited the farm houses, where I found much destitution among the women. The men were generally absent in the Confederate army, or had died at our approach. I administered to a great many sick among those destitute Georgians. On one occasion I called at the house of an old lady who was sick, and had quite a pretty young daughter living with her. I prescribed for the old lady, and furnished her with medicine and some needed delicacies, and gave her great and speedy relief. At her request I remained all night, and, there being no vacant bed in the house, slept with the daughter. Soon afterwards I was called upon to visit a very sick young man in the same neighborhood. By proper medical treatment and attention he was soon convalescent and I suddenly became very famous in that neighborhood--Exaggerated accounts of my skill and learning were noised abroad, and reached the ears of the old lady just mentioned. Not long after, I was overtaken by night outside the lines, and called upon the old lady for another night's entertainment. To my surprise she seemed reluctant and hesitating, and then said: "Look here, I'm afraid of you; I'm afraid to let you sleep with my daughter again, for I'm afraid you ain't a woman; I don't believe any woman could know as much about doctoring folks as you do." I tried to disabuse her mind of such an impression, but she only shook her head and said, "I'm afraid--I'd rather not." At length I unfastened my hair, and shaking it out upon my shoulders said: "Look here, did you ever see a man have such hair as that? Is not that a woman's hair?" "Oh, I don't know," said the old woman, folks has got a curious way of fastening hair on their heads in these days, and maybe it's fastened there. I'd rather not let you sleep with my daughter any more." I tried other means with better success, and greatly relieved, the old lady again put me in her daughter's bed.

ONE OF THE LOST TRIBES.--One of the "lost tribes" has turned up, safe and sound, in the shape of a people called the Falashas, who inhabit a district in Abyssinia, which has long remained a terra incognita and a blank space on the map. They were visited by Mr. Halvey, a very intelligent French traveler, who has now communicated an account of his journey to the French Geological Society. There were about 250,000 of the Falashas--They speak an ague dialect called Falashina, or Kailina, and into this language they have translated a Gheez version of the Old Testament. They do not practice polygamy. They circumcise their male children on the seventh day. Their proper names are derived from history, Gheez, and Amharic. In the Synagogues the sexes sit apart. Incense is burned during the services. Their religious hopes are turned to Jerusalem, but their idea of the Messiah are very indistinct. They are wholly unacquainted with Hebrew, and know nothing of the ceremonies instituted after the time of Ezra. They have a religious literature written in the style of the Midrash--They keep the Sabbath rigidly; fast on Mondays and Thursdays; keep the 6th of Ab to commemorate the destruction of Jerusalem; they wash before and say grace after eating; they have a traditional mode of slaughtering animals for food; they practice commemorative sacrifices on the holy days, and also for the repose of the souls of the dead. Their women enjoy equality with the men. They hold slaves, but liberate them after a servitude of six years.
