This done, the tubes are closed between two layers of glass; to do this they begin by placing on one side of the disc which contains the tubes a layer of crystal to which the tubes Ac's, PERC'S. BLACKLICK TW soon become attached. When this is done the disc is removed and a second layer of crystal is placed on the opposite side.

The object being placed in the centre between these two layers of glass soldered togather, it becomes necessary to give the ball its hemispherical form, which is done, when the crystal is again heated, by means of a concave spatula of moistened wood. It then only remains to anneal it and to polish it on the wheel.

That a glass ornament, being covered with a layer of hot glass, should receive no injury or change of color, may be easily understood from its extremely refractory nature; but it is not the same with objects in metal, such as watches, barometers, etc.; which a far less degree of heat would oxidize or even entirely destroy. The mode of manufacture, therefore, of these latter objacts is quite different from that of the first. It is easy to prove this. If we now examine a paper weight containing a watch or barometer, under the lower part of the ball will be found a piece of green cloth, the use of which is to keep in place the objects which, instead of only forming one body with the covering of glass which surrounds them, are only placed in a cavity made be forehand in the centre of the half-spherical ball. In a word, to take out the glass ornaments it would be necessary to break the paper-weight, whilst to take out the others it would suffice to take off the cloth.

As for the paper-weights in which are placed portraits, usually of a yellowish color, these profiles are made of refractory earth, and may thus bear well a heat which only softens glass. Manufactured successively at Venice, un-

der the name of Milleflori, and then in Bo hemia, these paper-weights have been carried to perfection only by French artists. The sole difficulty in their manufacture is in avoiding internal air-bubbles, which would

It is not the personal opiniou of Mastai Ferretti, or whoever else may occupy the Papal chair, to which the Church will be required to bow, but the solemn declarations made by the successor of St. Peter, with due deliberation, and with the full sense of his responsibility as the vicegerent of God on earth .-In this sense, the dogma of Papal infallibility has long been held and taught by distinguished Catholic theologians, and that they have finally won over their colleagues proves both the intrinsic force of their views and the ability with which they have been advanced. Indeed, the infallibility of the Pope as an official teacher of religious truth is only the legitimate flowering and crown of the whole mass of Catholic theology. If men must submit their reason at all to anthority, that authority can properly be no other than that of a divinely ordained and constituted priesthood. The priesthood again must have an organization and a head; and what better head can be found than the lineal successor of him to whom the founder of Christianity committed the keys of the kingdom of heaven? And when we have got as far as this, and recognize in the Bishop of Rome the accredited instrument through which God rules the Church, logic compels the admission that this instrument is and remains under divine guidance, and can no

the first step of this reasoning, and so avoid the last; but all those among them who admit that any doctrine, such as that of the Trinity and the Vicarous Atonement, for example, must be believed under pain of damnation, whether rationally understood or not, have no right to sneer at the Cathelies for accepting as true the decisions of their ecclesiastical chief. ally known how easy a matter it is to examine the bottom of a well, cistern or pond of water by the use of a common mirror .-When the sun is shining, hold a mirror so that the reflected rays of light will fall into the water. A bright spot may be seen at the bottom so light as to show the smallest object very plainly. By this means we have examined the bottom of wells fifty feet deep, when half full or more of water. The smallest straw or other small objects can be perfectly seen from the surface. In the same way one can examine the bottom of ponds and rivers, if the water be somewhat clear, and not agitated by winds or rapid motion. If a well or clatern be under cover, or shaded by a building, so that the sunlight will not fall near the opening, it is only necessary to employ two mirrors, using one to reflect the light to the opening, and another to send it down perpendicularly in the water. Light may be thrown fifty or a hun dred yards into the precise spot desired, and then reflected downward. We have used the mirror with success to reflect the light around the field to a shaded spot, and also to carry it from a south window through two rooms and then into a cistern on the north side of the house. Half a dozen reflections of the light may be made, though each mirror diminishes the brilliancy of the light. Let any one not familiar with this method try it, and he will find it not only
