Ye General Court has recordingly given secret orders to Master Malachi Huxett of ye brig Porpose to wayhaye ve said Welcome shilic as near ye WINTED CADMENTO DOD MEN C. DOVC coase of Codde as may be, and make captive ye said Fenne and his ungodlie crewe so that ye Lord may be glorified and not mocked on ye soll of this new countrie with ye heathen worshippe of these people. Much spoyle can be made by selling ye whole lotte to Barbadoes where slaves fetch goode prices in rumme and Pants from \$1.50 to \$9. Vests from 15 cents sugar and we shall noot only do ve heri great to \$5. Also, a general variety of service by punishing ye wicked but we shall make great gayne for his ministers and people. Master Huxett feels hopefull and I will set down ye news he brings when his shippe comes UMBRELLAS, SATCHELS, TRUNKS, &c. back.

Master Huxett missed his reckoning and Penn sailed secure within the Capes of the Delaware. But it is carious to reflect on the narrow chance by which the founder of this common wealth escaped the fate of many of his religions brethren who were east ashore on the relentless coast of Massachusetts. In is strange to fancy the wise lawgiver, endeared to the hearts of a great people and their posterity by his wisdom, sagacity and benevolence, hoeing sugar in Barbadoes un der the lash of a Yankee overseer, or crush ing cano into ruin to thaw the granite gizzards which Mather and his theological brethren carried about instead of hearts .--Ah ! How the ancient Cotton must have mourned for the marketable Quakers and the refreshing "rumme" which came not. It is delightful to think how he never got a bit of the "spoyle" which his devilish old soul held in delicious anticipa-tion-how brother Higginson watched fondly for his hogshead, and dreamed of swallowing his half score of heretics in pious punches.
